COMMISSION OF INQUIRY INTO MONEY LAUNDERING IN BRITISH COLUMBIA The Honourable Mr. Austin F. Cullen, Commissioner AFFIDAVIT

I, Sherri-Lynn Foran, with a business address of 333 North River Road (Vanier Tower A), Ottawa, Ontario, **AFFIRM** THAT:

- 1. I am the Director of the Appeals & Enforcement Litigation Division of the Recourse Directorate, in the Finance and Corporate Management Branch of the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA).
- 2. I have personal knowledge of the facts and matters herein deposed to, save and except where such facts and matters are stated to be made upon information and belief, and as to such facts and matters I do believe them to be true.

Currency or Monetary Instrument Seizures & Reviews

- 3. A traveller whose currency or monetary instrument was seized by a CBSA officer pursuant to the CBSA's powers under the *Proceeds of Crime (Money Laundering) and Terrorist Financing Act (PCMLTFA)*, may request a decision of the Minister regarding the appropriateness of the seizure. If dissatisfied with the ministerial decision, an action and/or judicial review may be pursued before the Federal Court.
- 4. Additionally, any person or entity who has an interest as owner of the currency or monetary instrument seized, may bring a third party application to the Provincial Court for relief.

The CBSA Recourse Directorate

- 5. The Recourse Program provides travellers and businesses with an accessible mechanism to seek an impartial review of CBSA decisions, as well as to voice any feedback or complaints in accordance with policies and legislation administered by the agency. It also manages civil litigation before various courts and tribunals, and provides a harmonized national litigation management function for the CBSA.
- 6. A person from whom currency or monetary instruments were seized, or the lawful owner of the currency or monetary instruments may request a decision of the Minister pursuant to section 25 of the *PCMLTFA*. In a ministerial review, the Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness, through the Minister's

- delegated authorities, impartially reviews and decides on the appropriateness of the enforcement action. This review is conducted within the Enforcement Appeals Unit of the Recourse Directorate.
- 7. The ministerial decision may be challenged by way of a judicial review pursuant to section 18.1(1) of the *Federal Courts Act*, or an action to the Federal Court in accordance with section 30(1) of the *PCMLTFA*. In addition, provisions exist for third party applications directly to the Provincial Court, in accordance with section 32 of the *PCMLTFA*. The Enforcement Litigation Unit (ELU) of the Recourse Directorate Program is responsible for providing support to the Department of Justice in defending the CBSA's position before the courts.

CBSA Recourse Directorate Program Data

- 8. The following two tables provide data relating to ministerial reviews of *PCMLTFA* currency or monetary instrument seizures and challenges of ministerial decisions to the Federal Court, as well as any third party applications brought in the Provincial Court. Both tables provide data for each of the past five fiscal years and, for each year, indicate the total number of ministerial reviews or appeals/applications to the courts and the number of those reviews or appeals/applications that succeeded in overturning the underlying decision. The data is disaggregated to show the number of reviews relating to each of the four *PCMLTFA* seizure levels, and to show the number of reviews relating to *PCMLTFA* seizures in BC and Canada-wide.
- 9. Table 1 presents data relating to ministerial reviews of *PCMLTFA* currency or monetary instrument seizures within the Enforcement Appeals Unit. I am informed and do verily believe that the data in Table 1 was collected from the Recourse Information Management System on February 5, 2021:
