AFFIDAVIT NO. 2 of JOSEPH EMILE LEONARD MEILLEUR

I, Joseph Emile Leonard Meilleur, of THAT:

- 1. I am a former employee of the Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch ("GPEB") and, as such, I have personal knowledge of the facts and matters deposed to in this affidavit, save and except where based on information and belief, and where so stated, I believe it to be true.
- 2. On February 9, 2021, I swore an affidavit that has been marked as Exhibit 587 in these Commission Proceedings.

Training

3. In my role as Executive Director of Compliance of GPEB, I would encourage and recommend training for GPEB Compliance staff, including GPEB Investigators. The Directors, Senior Directors, and Managers under my supervision were responsible for ensuring that employees were supported and encouraged to take training. I did not have the authority to approve budget and spending for training. Only the Assistant Deputy Minister (ADM) has this authority. GPEB did not have a specific line item in its budget for training or any dedicated funding for training. Ministerial approval was required for any budgetary expenditures for training. Obtaining funding for training and attendance to gaming related conferences or workshops was a constant challenge for me as our budget annually did not increase and there were very limited funds made available for these

purposes by the Ministry of Finance due to competing budget demand and budget constraints. The Ministry of Finance did not increase GPEB's budget or amend it for the purpose of training during my tenure as Executive Director of Compliance.

- 4. Training requests were brought forward to the Executive for prioritization and recommendation for approval by the Assistant Deputy Minister. The Executive was comprised of the Assistant Deputy Minister and the various Executive Directors and Directors in charge of various specific programs in GPEB.
- 5. For any expenditure by government for training or professional membership or dues, a request was submitted to the Assistant Deputy Minister for approval. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "A"** (GPEB5838) is a true copy of a business case prepared by Mr. Robert Stewart, Manager of GPEB Intelligence, for Mr. John Mazure, Assistant Deputy Minister, to Request Ministry of Finance's approval to secure funds for the purpose of joining the Association of Law Enforcement Intelligence Units (LEIU) and the National Gaming Information Sharing Group (NGISG) for GPEB's Intelligence Unit.
- 6. I supported the request for funding for the membership dues for LEIU and NGISG. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "B"** (GPEB5863) is a true copy of an email exchange from me to the Executive documenting my support for this initiative and advising of the Assistant Deputy Minister's approval for the membership dues.
- 7. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "C"** (GPEB5841) is a true copy of a GPEB List of Training/Webinars/Education attended by GPEB staff and investigators from 2013 to early 2015. This form of document was typically used for tracking what training was approved for the divisions of GPEB.
 - 8. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "D"** (GPEB5844) is a true copy of a spreadsheet containing Compliance Staff Training Proposed and Approved for 2015 and early 2016.
 - Attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "E" (GPEB5851) is a true copy of a Spreadsheet documenting Compliance Training Requests 2016/2017.

- Attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "F" (GPEB5854) is a true copy of a Spreadsheet documenting Compliance Training Requests 2017/2018.
- 11. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "**G**" (GPEB5880) is a true copy of a Spreadsheet documenting upcoming GPEB Conference and Training 2017/2018 dated May 3, 2017.
- 12. Exhibits E, F, and G refer to acronyms and titles which I have expanded upon below:
 - a. Canadian Gaming Regulators Association (CAGRA) provided a venue for Regulators in Canada to address money laundering concerns. GPEB made presentations at CAGRA about money laundering issues and concerns in their in person jurisdictional update.
 - b. BCLC's New Horizons in Responsible Gambling conference, which brought together responsible gambling researchers, policy makers, regulators and industry representatives from around the world to discuss developments in prevention, response and best practices. It was an annual conference since 2013. My recollection is that David Horricks, Executive Director of Responsible Gambling at GPEB, worked with BCLC to organize components for this conference. GPEB Compliance staff attended this annual conference.
 - c. Protecting the Game is a course offered to gaming investigator by the University of Nevada located in Las Vegas. This course provided by the Nevada Gaming Commission offered gaming investigators an opportunity to discuss mutual concerns including AML.
 - d. The North American Gaming Regulators Association (NAGRA) NAGRA was an international version of CAGRA. There are AML components in the annual conference.

- e. LEIU had webinars and conference calls with an AML component.
- f. The Canadian Gaming Summit was an annual summit that had a regulatory component which addressed AML through workshops and panels.
- 13. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "H" (GPEB5896)** is a true copy of my email to Courtney Poirier. Ms. Poirier worked in the unit responsible for GPEB budget management under the Assistant Deputy Minister. It attaches a spreadsheet of the training I request for GPEB staff and investigators for 2017/2018.
- 14. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "I"** (**GPEB5849**) is a copy of the 2017/2018 spreadsheet found at Exhibit H, with the additional columns of Priority and 2016/17 Attendees.
- 15. My request to have Canadian Anti-Money Laundering Institute (CAMLI) certification for GPEB investigators was not approved and it was deferred to the 2018/2019 fiscal year. The CAMLI certification was the Canadian equivalent of ACAMS certification.
- 16. In my role as acting Assistant Deputy Minister, while Mr. Mazure was on vacation, I approved CAMLI training for Mr. John Bressette, a GPEB Investigator.
- 17. Attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "J" (GPEB 5894) and Exhibit "K" (GPEB5895) are true copies of my email exchanged with Chris Knight, Regional Director, approving Mr. Bressette's Canadian Anti-Money Laundering Institute (CAMLI) training.
- 18. I had a membership to ACAMS during my tenure as Executive Director of Compliance through BCLC's corporate membership. It provided me access to the website and free webinars. I regularly forwarded any training materials, including webinars to my compliance staff. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "L" (GPEB5912)** is an example of me forwarding an ACAMs Presentation to Mr. Scott McGregor and Mr. Ken Ackles.
- 19. During my tenure, I am aware that some GPEB staff completed ACAMS training offered by BCLC.

Presence of GPEB Investigators

- 20. During my tenure as Executive Director of Compliance of GPEB, in late 2016 or early 2017, I provided direction to Anna Fitzgerald and Robert Stewart that GPEB Investigators needed to have a greater presence in casinos. At that time, we had limited resources. Investigators' presence was normally Monday to Friday between the hours of 9AM to 5PM. I directed that GPEB investigators have a presence during the evenings and weekends at Lower Mainland casinos. However, at that time, GPEB did not have sufficient staff of investigators to do coverage of evenings and weekends at casinos.
- 21. It is my recollection that the initiative discussed above in paragraph 17 of my Affidavit was advanced by Ms. Fitzgerald to the Assistant Deputy Minister and I understand it continued to be advanced after my retirement. Ms. Fitzgerald succeeded me as Executive Director of Compliance. It was a lengthy process, as it took several months to obtain approvals from the Ministry Strategic Planning and to navigate through the Human Resources process to fill new or vacant positions. I am advised by Ms. Anna Fitzgerald and Robert Stewart, and verily believe this initiative came to fruition after my departure.

PURPOSE

This business case is to request Ministry of Finance approval to join the Association of Law Enforcement Intelligence Units (LETU) which includes full membership in the National Gambling Information Sharing Group (NGISG). The annual fee for membership in the LETU is \$595.00.

BACKGROUND

"Over the years LETU has expanded its role within the criminal intelligence field to also include the establishment of professional standards and guidelines, comprehensive training, conferences and regional training courses, authoritative publications, networking opportunities, and an independent voice in advocating information sharing and professionalism in the criminal intelligence field. Today, LETU's stated mission is: "Providing leadership and promoting professionalism in the criminal intelligence community in order to protect public safety and constitutional rights." |

The NGISG works toward a common goal of gathering information and producing timely intelligence that is shared within the working group. NGISG members' extensive knowledge in all areas of the gambling industry has evolved this working group into an essential component that consistently prevents and mitigates criminal activity targeting the gambling industry. 2

CURRENT STATE

The GPEB Intelligence Unit consists of one Manager and one Senior Field Analyst who filled the newly created position in April, 2016. Working relationships with the GPEB Investigators and Auditors has been established facilitating a somewhat adequate flow of current information. However there are challenges in the area of data mining existing information sources given the search limitations in GOS, the various procedures and systems related to reports and information storage and the lack of analytical software. These issues are a priority and are being addressed as the unit evolves.

The GPEB Intel Unit is expanding its external Police and Government intelligence networks and is recognized as a police intelligence agency by the RCMP, CFSEU-BC and local major police agencies. A MOU with the RCMP that will support information sharing with their Federal and Provincial units as well as their Municipal Detachments is nearing completion.

On the international front the GPEB Intelligence Unit attends a monthly meeting of the Regional Intelligence Group (RIG) which is comprised of Law Enforcement agencies from both sides of the

Canada/USA border including Vancouver Police Dept., RCMP, CSIS, CBSA, US Customs, US Border Patrol, US State Department to name a few. Topics discussed are related to issues of common interest including organized crime and the travelling criminal.

We have also been invited and currently hold the status of "guest member" with the National Gaming Information Sharing Group. This is a USA based entity consisting of government gaming enforcement agencies from both the US and Canada. These are Law Enforcement based gaming enforcement entities with similar mandates to the GPEB Compliance Division. To become a regular member of the NGISG and have full access to their on-line databases we need to take the next step and join the LEIU.

The GPEB Intelligence Unit is currently focusing on the impact of organized crime and money laundering on the integrity of gaming in BC casinos with the goal of supporting local Law Enforcement operations and informing GPEB Management and subsequently Government.

ISSUES, RISKS AND OPPORTUNITIES

Highly effective and successful intelligence units rely greatly on the extent and depth of their intelligence networks. Membership in the LEIU presents itself as a great opportunity to connect with virtually all significant law enforcement intelligence agencies in North America. In addition the LEIU is an excellent resource for aiding in the establishment of best practices, recommended standards for collection and storage of information, assessing new products and software as well as management and leadership guides. LEIU members are also given access to an on-line gaming index to assist agencies with gaming license background checks. More importantly for the GPEB Intel Unit, membership in LEIU allows for full membership in the NGISG and all the products and intelligence shared by the group. "The NGISG works toward a common goal of gathering information and producing timely intelligence that is shared within the working group. NGISG members' extensive knowledge in all areas of the gambling industry has evolved this working group into an essential component that consistently prevents and mitigates criminal activity targeting the gambling industry." 5

There is very little risk associated with this membership as the intelligence that is typically shared is about information regarding crime trends, methods of criminal operations, ideologies of extremists groups, fraudulent schemes, cheating at play and other non-identifying information that helps describe and understand criminal activity. GPEB Intel Unit adheres to all the very restrictive and current policies and procedures dictated by law related to sharing personal information with other police agencies.

If after a year it is determined that membership in the LEIU and subsequently the NGISG does not support the needs of the GPEB Intel Unit then the annual membership will be cancelled.

3) About NGISG, LEIU website

PROPOSAL

The GPEB Intelligence Unit is a relatively new entity that, to be truly efficient and effective, needs to establish itself within the greater police intelligence community. A successful intelligence unit must also remain current with best practices, criminal trends and the evolution of organized crime activity.

At present the GPEB Intel Unit is developing a foothold in the local and Pacific Northwest police community that is proving to be productive for our needs. However in order to move forward we need to continue to build on our credibility as a unit. Belonging to the LEIU will go a long way in

supporting that goal as membership in this well established organization is very restrictive and will create the necessary level of trust required to effectively share information with a greater number of other agencies. Securing the funds and approval to join is just the first step in becoming a member of LEIU. There is a rigorous application process that requires sponsorship from another member agency, of which I have verbal intent from the VPD that they will do so, submitting a detailed description of our functions and capabilities, review by the LEIU Executive Committee and subsequent vote.

In addition to access to the established North American police intelligence network the LEIU provides support for maintaining a professional intelligence unit that applies best practices and procedures.

Furthermore and the heart of this proposal is that membership in the LEIU includes full membership status in the NGISG which is described on their website as follows:

"The National Gambling Intelligence Sharing Group (NGISG) was established in 2004 as a national enforcement group whose primary objective is the coordination of gambling related intelligence. NGISG members are comprised of vetted Law Enforcement Intelligence Units (LEIU) members and invited guests spanning the United States and Canada responsible for intelligence functions related to gambling enforcement within their jurisdictions. Criminal operations targeting the gambling industry routinely cross jurisdictional lines when conducting criminal activity. The NGISG works toward a common goal of gathering information and producing timely intelligence that is shared within the working group. NGISG members' extensive knowledge in all areas of the gambling industry has evolved this working group into an essential component that consistently prevents and mitigates criminal activity targeting the gambling industry." The value in having the opportunity to interact with other intel units who have the same mandate and face similar challenges is invaluable. The gaming industry has proven to be very vulnerable to all levels of organized crime and to have the opportunity to share experiences with other jurisdictions and create situational awareness with the goal of mitigating the impact of organized crime cannot be understated.

The GPEB Intel Unit is currently holds a "guest membership" until our application process in LEIU is complete. Full membership allows for greater access to on-line databases as well as the credibility needed to share information in a time sensitive manner.

There is every indication that the GPEB Intel Unit will be accepted as a member of the LEIU and the NGISG and I therefore request approval to secure the necessary annual fee of \$595.00USD and apply for the LEIU and NGISG for membership.

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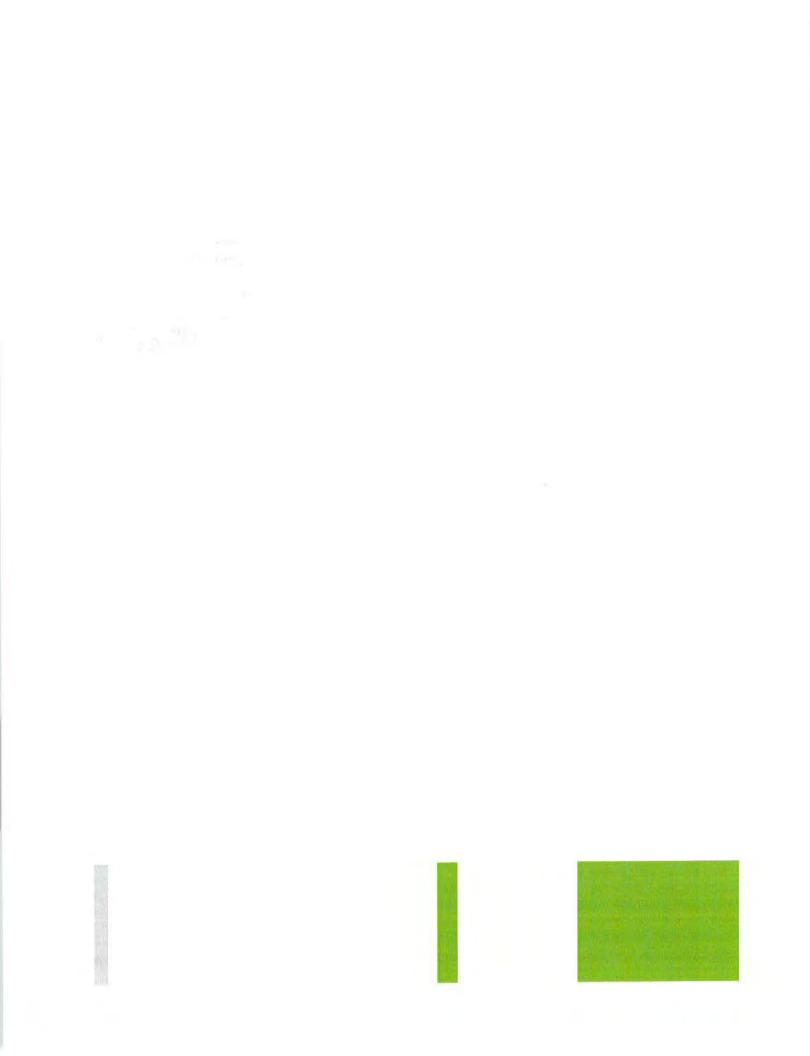

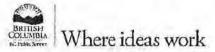

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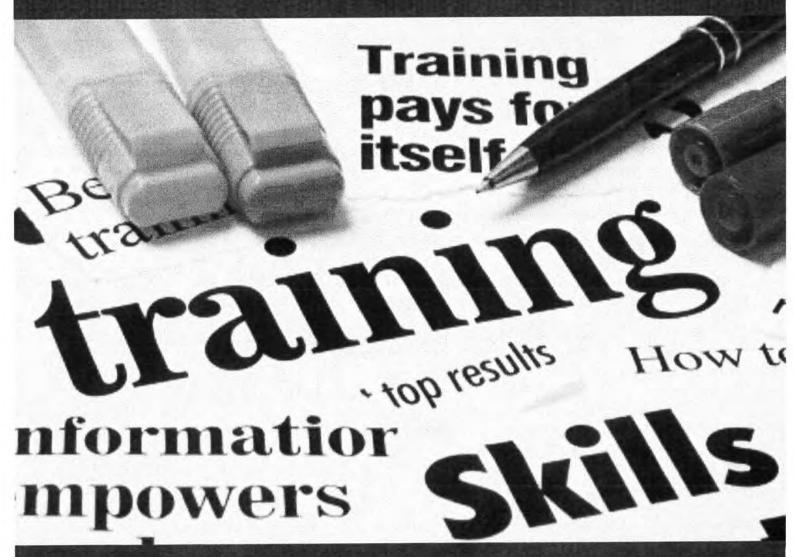

Workshop 1 - Employee Fraud: The Signs, Risks and Preventive Measures September 11, 2017 - 7:30am - 11:45am

Sound risk assessment programs must look at mitigating the risks generated by a business' workforce. This has become increasingly relevant in today's money laundering control environment, given the prevalence of media reports that describe employees who have: played a key role in the success of money laundering within their organization; planned and carried out internal frauds, generating funds that had to be laundered to escape attracting attention; or used workplace skills to recognize fraud and the movement of dirty money in order to successfully perpetrate their own fraudulent schemes.

Jeff Filliter's career has included numerous files where he has been brought in to investigate and identify the perpetrators of suspected fraud-

ulent schemes; and work with businesses to develop fraud prevention control programs. This experience and supporting case studies will be explored from the risk and subsequent risk mitigation perspectives. Jeff will define employee fraud and support that definition through a detailed look at case studies that he personally investigated. Jeff plans to encourage audience participation by exploring different perspectives, options, and techniques that could be applied in each case. Finally, Jeff wants to promote practical application through a discussion of how each crime might have been prevented, focusing on identifying the most effective preventative measures to use.

Workshop 2 - Using Statistical Data with Risk Assessments: What's Available and How to Use It Effectively September 13, 2017, 12:30pm - 5:00pm

An integral component of all risk assessment programs is for the reporting entity Compliance Officer to identify, confirm, assess, and justify the risks associated with the business itself and the customers who purchase its products and services. That multi-tiered process requires drawing conclusions from information sources available on the environment in which the business operates and the demographic features each customer brings to the business relationship with the reporting entity. Crime, employment, income, population, industrial, economic, and age factors are but some of the data sources that can be used to differentiate degrees of risk across business products, services, delivery methods, and geographic locations; as well as when it comes to drilling down to the customer level and the assignment of risk to each customer.

The workshop has been structured to examine the topic from three aspects. First will be a discussion of the types of statistical data that are extremely useful when performing KYC activities and the subsequent development of Risk Assessment parameters (e.g. local and regional crime, employment, income, and population statistics). Once this data expanse has been explored, the presenters will look at the different levels of data that is available; the sources for that data; how to read and understand statistical tables; and what the numbers mean and don't mean. Finally, the presenters will explore the variety of methods that Compliance Officers can use the data to strengthen business and customer risk assessments. Visual representations, heat mapping, and the layering of data techniques are all very effective ways of displaying the data to support contextual discussions. They help bring the risk assessment arguments and positions alive and make them meaningful.

Session Presenter - Jeff Filliter J.R. Filliter Investigative Services

Jeff Filliter has over 43 years of investigative experience with the R.C.M.P., Scotiabank, and in private practice. He holds an honors degree in Administrative Studies (BA), with distinction, has been a Certified Fraud Examiner since 1995, and specializes in domestic and international fraud, money laundering, and asset tracing. He has provided expert civil and criminal testimony globally, and has been declared a professional witness in the U.K. Jeff is an expert in financial and white-collar crime; fraud; money laundering; terrorist financing; proceeds of crime; forensic investigations; organized crime; risk management; and security. In 2016, Jeff published a book titled 'The Shallowest of Men', a fictionalized version of factual events, involving murder, fraud, money laundering and corruption.

Session Presenter - Marta Burczycka Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics, Statistics Canada

Marta Burczycka (pronounced Burr-chit-ska) is an analyst and author at the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics (a division of Statistics Canada). Using data from a variety of survey and administrative sources, she has written on topics ranging from police resources, transition homes for women, and trends in administration of justice offences. Most recently, Marta has been the lead author of the annual publication Family Violence in Canada: A Statistical Profile. Her experience at the Centre also includes managing the Police Administration, Homicide, and Transition Home Surveys, preparing material for presentation to various Parliamentary and Senate committees, and representing Statistics Canada on the multi-departmental federal Family Violence Initiative. Marta has presented at international academic conferences and has led workshops aimed at familiarizing researchers with Statistics Canada data holdings. She holds a Master of Arts degree in Sociology (Carleton, 2006), is English/French bilingual and fluent in Polish. Marta currently lives in Ottawa, Ontario.

Session Presenter - Julian Arend About Business Crime Solutions, Inc.

Julian Arend is an AML/CTF consultant with ABCsolutions. In that capacity, one of his primary responsibilities is monitoring the Canadian compliance regime for an MSB, for whom he assesses customer risk, develops risk mitigation and data collection protocols, and organizes AML/CTF reporting. Prior to joining ABCsolutions, Julian was an award-winning educator, teaching adults at both the College and University levels for over a decade. From 2009 to 2014, he was also a Research Fellow at the Centre for International and Security Studies at York University where he conducted specialized research on terrorism/counterterrorism, political communication and public policy, and was invited to present his findings at a number of international conferences in those fields. Through his extensive work and academic experience, Julian has gained expertise in data analysis and in developing effective methods to synthesize complex data points into meaningful frameworks that can be communicated simply and applied with clarity.

May 2016 - FinCEN Awards Recognize Partnership Between Law Enforcement and Financial Institutions to Fight Financial Crime

Financial institution reporting played a key role in the investigation of one of the top international proliferators for weapons of mass destruction (WMD), as well as a principal supplier to Iran's ballistic missile program.



CASE 1 DETAILS

- ✓ Criminal (national of china) 12(+) aliases
- ✓ Used network of front companies to funnel transactions covertly and illegallythrough U.S. Fls
- Used aliases and fictitious business names to conceal beneficiaries of wire transfers that passed through bank account in U.S. knowing beneficiaries had been identified by OFAC as SDNs
- ✓ Concealed involvement from both U.S.-Based correspondent banks and U.S. Regulators







CASE 1 DETAILS

- ✓ FBI reviewed dozens of reports from FIs re multiple front companies.
- ✓ Many front companies used same address or close variant as company that had been put on OFAC SDN list
- ✓ Based on 40+ reports from numerous banks, FBI determined network had laundered millions through multiple U.S. Banks
- ✓ Info in FI reports helped identify over 20 front companies and bank accounts







CASE 1 DETAILS

- ✓ FBI identified 165 transactions used to illegally funnel ~\$8.5m through U.S. Financial system
- ✓ Harnessing FI reports, FBI conducted outreach to U.S. banks through FinCEN to seize millions from proliferators' foreign bank accounts
- ✓ DOJ seized~\$6.5m from proliferators' bank accounts
- ✓ OFAC designated 8 associated front companies
- ✓ Dept. of commerce added 9 China-based suppliers to entity list







A dozen reports filed by five different Fis revealed a large-scale, organized criminal enterprise that participated in bank fraud, conspiracy to operate an unlicensed wholesale distribution of drugs, and money laundering.



CASE 2 DETAILS

- ✓ Dozen reports filed by 5 Fls revealed large-scale criminal enterprise
- Operating array of criminal activities including sale of diverted pharmaceuticals and money laundering
- ✓ Reporting provided list of bank accounts controlled by >30 suspected. individuals who established accounts to launder illicit funds
- ✓ Perpetrators formed multiple shell companies, some under false identities, to liquidate drug proceeds







CASE 2 DETAILS

- ✓ Info provided by Fls showed perpetrators withdrew > \$15m cash from 1 bank account over 2 years
- FI reporting assisted government to decipher web of shell companies, false identities, and additional bank accounts utilized by organization
- Government investigators reviewed records for >500 bank accounts







CASE 2 DETAILS

- √ >\$28.6M seized from multiple accounts used to launder drug proceeds
- ✓ FI reporting pivotal for near real-time info to identify bank accounts & account information to secure seizure
- √ >\$2.5m of street-diverted pharmaceuticals also seized

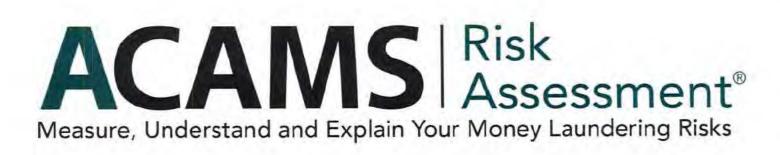


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
