EXPERIENCE

Rolf van Wegberg is an assistant professor (UD) at Delft University of Technology. Originally trained as a criminologist, he received his MSc-degree (cum laude) from Leiden University in 2011 with a thesis on money laundering and the funding of terrorism in the Netherlands. After graduation, he joined the Department of Criminal Law and Criminology at Leiden University as a researcher and lecturer. In 2013 he moved to TNO, where he worked as a research scientist on the economics of cybercrime. Predominantly involved in TNO's Dark Web research program, he investigated new and evolving criminal business models.

Early 2015 he joined TU Delft (TPM/MAS) as a PhD Candidate at the Economics of Cybersecurity research group. His research is embedded in the MALPAY project, focusing on criminal strategies in profit-driven cybercrime. Therein he particularly studies criminal strategies by reconstructing cybercrime value chains, identifying their relation and dependence on underground markets. In 2019 he continued as a postdoc in the same group. Together with bachelor and master students, and in collaboration with Dutch law enforcement, he analyzes large-scale datasets - like seized online anonymous markets - to derive criminal strategies and find evidence-based intervention strategies.

More closely related to his scientific work, Rolf frequently serves as an expert-witness in cybercrime related court cases, trains law enforcement and judicial professionals in the various aspects of cybercrime policing and is regularly invited for international keynotes and interviews in (inter)national media outlets. In 2017, he spent early summer as a visiting researcher at the criminological research institute Transcrime (Milan, Italy) and was named one of 50 most influential cyber security experts in The Netherlands.

Currently, Rolf works as an assistant professor at the Faculty of Technology, Policy & Management of Delft University of Technology on a range of topics closely related to his PhD research within the field of cybercrime governance.
